Speaking on this occasion, Dr. Vinitaa Apte, President, TERRE Policy Centre said “Climate Change is a very big challenge for global community

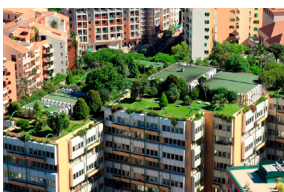


Green roof design reduces the immediate water run-off by 50-90 % - greatly reducing drainage flow rates.

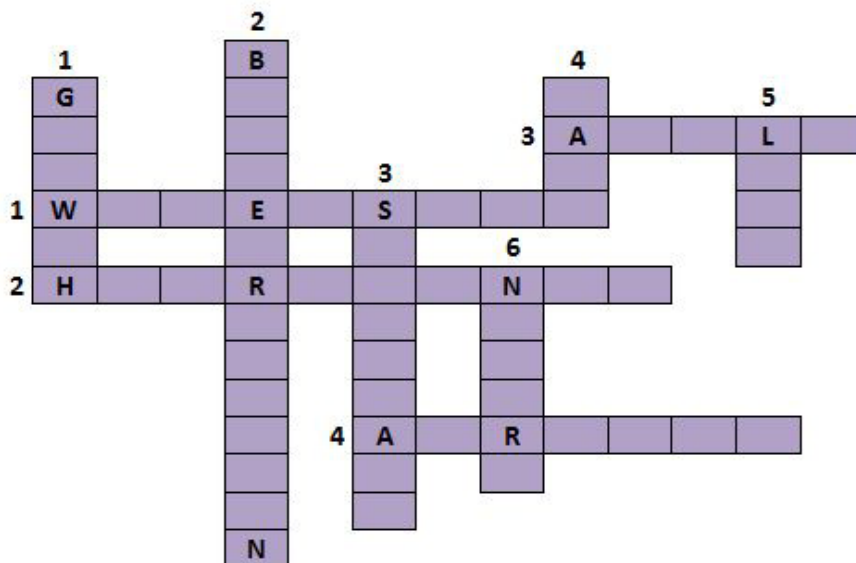

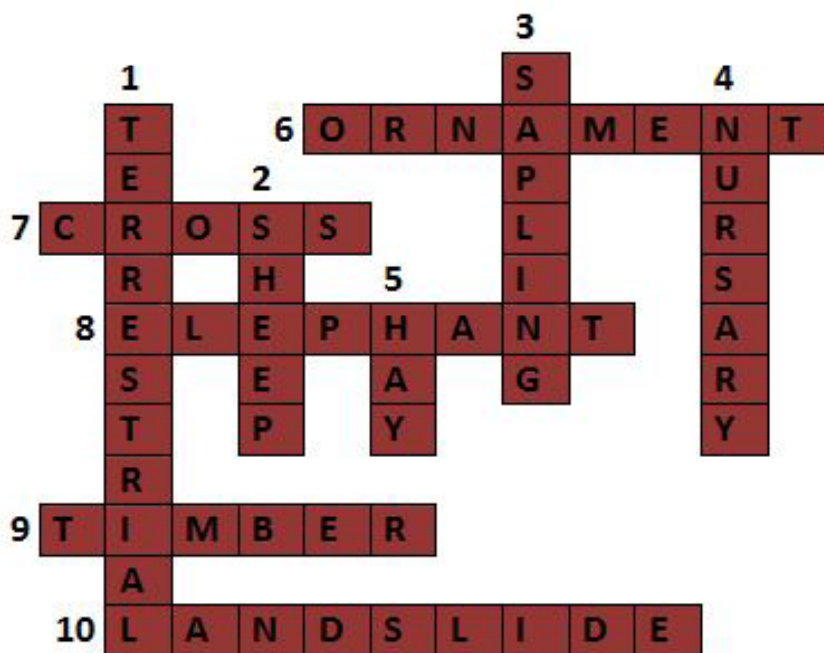

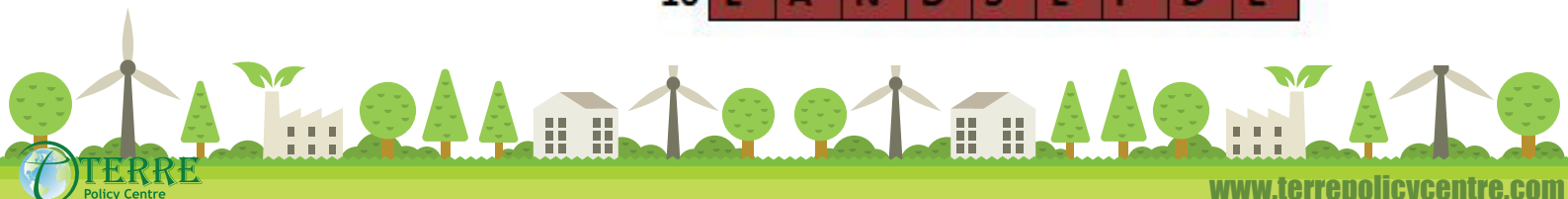
